A New Grave

A number of people have asked us about a new grave in All Saints Churchyard, which was closed to burials in 2007. Other than the interment of some medieval bones found when the work was going on in the Churchyard in 2009 we believe the last burial was in 1994.

The new grave is on the west side of the Church.

We asked the Chairman of the Parochial Church Council (PCC), David Sykes, about the new grave and he replied on behalf of the PCC

"In response to your question, the PCC can confirm the following:

Arrangements were made by the former Rector of All Saints Church Dulverton for the reburial in the churchyard of a close relative of a local family. The re-burial was agreed on compassionate grounds. The burial was in an

unused part of the churchyard and a memorial stone will be added at a later date"

We thank him for his quick response which has answered the questions.



A letter from Jane Lewis

Thank you for all the useful information you include in the Dulverton Voice.

I would however like to make a small comment regarding something in your Short and Sweet section, page 4 of Issue 8.

I am very much in favour of raising funds for the Youth Club but it is not registered on the EasyFundRaising site as “the Dulverton and District Young People’s Project” as stated in the Voice. It is registered as “Riverside Youth Club, Dulverton”. If “the Dulverton and District Young People’s Project” is typed into the Search box to find a Good Cause it will not find our Youth Club!

If just Dulverton is typed in it will find:

1. Dulverton All Saint’s School Association, Somerset
2. Friends of Dulverton School, New Eltham, and
3. Riverside Youth Club, Dulverton

A PostCode search (TA22) will find the 2 local causes registered; our School, and our Youth Club. This gives the good people of Dulverton a choice of who to support, both causes potentially benefiting to our youngsters

It is a small point but I am aware that many people are soon put off when they struggle with technology or it ‘doesn’t seem to work’! The more people who register for this fundraising, the more will be raised. So far only 5 people have registered for the Riverside Youth Club but already £14.15 has been raised in the 2 weeks since it was registered with easyfundraising.org.uk and

Know Your Dulverton

We are starting a new series of articles on some notable and some not so notable buildings in and around Dulverton.

We start off with one of the iconic and probably the most well-known building:- **THE TOWN HALL**

The first Market Hall was built in the 1760's to replace the Shambles and was used as a meeting house and a magistrate's court. It took another 100 years before the Shambles was demolished.

The Shambles was a rather tumbledown collection of shanties that straggled down the middle of Fore Street, in front of the Town Hall, and which were used by traders to sell their wares.

In 1866 the present building was built with the existing Market Hall and open areas constructed beneath the upper floor. Metal gates were added in the late 1800's with the lower part often used to house the Town Fire Engine until, after the First World War, a better site was found in Lady Street.

In 1927, at the request of the Hon Mary Herbert, A. E. Richardson, a renowned



architect, converted the Hall and added the steps as you see the exterior today.

During 1998 the Hall was extensively refurbished, in which the public lavatories and stairs to the rear were removed and In this space, an extension was built which housed the loos, interior stairs, a lift and a new kitchen. Also at the same time other improvements were made, including the lower meeting room, two more loos and additional spaces created.

Perhaps latterly the Town Hall and the Town became better known outside Dulverton as the location for the making of the film, The Land Girls.

Two of the older members are now apprentices and run one evening for the 7 to 11 age group.

From the Dulverton Town Council Minutes

100 Years 1915

There were no items of interest in 1914 as the 1st World War was imminent, so I have taken 1915 as being more newsworthy.

“Correspondence from the War Office and the Chief Constable requesting the Council to take immediate steps to reduce the public lighting in the streets until further notice and in the case of approach of enemy aircraft, to make arrangements that all lights be extinguished for the remainder of the night” was read.

It was unanimously resolved to extinguish the majority of the lights and the whole lot to be extinguished at 9 pm. until further notice, and in the case of approach of enemy aircraft the sexton be requested to ring the tenor bell and to recommend that the Telephone Office be kept open until 10 pm.

Ed note. Street lighting again! Those that can remember that street lights were not lit and moving about in the dark was the norm during the war. Again nothing new.

50 Years 1964

Resolved that with a view to reducing the danger, especially to children crossing from Bank Square to Fore Street, the local Highway Authority be asked to consider erecting railings the width of the pavement adjoining Sherwood House.

Recommended that tenders be invited for the painting of the gates to the Recreation Ground-colour-Laurel Green-2 Coats-Also to reset the large gate. Tenders to be considered at the next meeting.

Ed note. The highways obviously would not concede to this request. Their reason would have been that to bar the way on the pavement meant that pedestrians would have had to step into the road in Bank Square.

25 Years 1989

A member drew the Council’s attention to dead fish floating on a stretch of the river between Marsh Bridge and New Bridge. The Clerk was asked to write to South West Water and ask for the fish to be removed, and should their death be caused by pollution to please notify the Council of the cause of death.

Ed note. Were none of the council members fishermen?

Dulverton flew out to a 4 goal lead but this was soon caught up by the youngsters from Exeter and at the end of the first quarter, they were leading by 4! The Dulverton girls went back out and put a lot of pressure on Panthers who began to make mistakes and at half time, Dulverton were only 1 goal behind. In the second half the game was too close to call with both teams scoring goals at an amazing pace. The game was very tense in the last five minutes but neither team gave an inch and the game ended in a 40-40 draw! **Player of the match was Abi Howarth**. These were two fantastic results to finish this part of the season and at the Christmas break, Dulverton are comfortably in 5th place in the league and

Football – On 23rd November, Dulverton Football Club 1st team travelled to Nether Stowey in a Division 2 match. The team knew this was likely to be a tough fixture and it turned out to be just that. Eventually after a very close game, they lost 2-1 with Adrian Smith getting the goal for Dulverton. On 30th November, the 1st team had a Knockout Cup game away against Division 1 side Staplegrave Reserves. Dulverton took an early lead with a clever flick from Josh Hopkins with his back to goal. Both sides had chances to score but with 25 minutes to go, Dulverton broke out of their own half quickly and good interplay put Stoirm Arnold free who made no mistake to put his side 2v0 ahead. Staplegrave threw everything they had at Town to get back into the game and on 80 minutes were awarded a penalty. Adam Smith stepped up and blasted his shot which the keeper, Tom Ridler, saved but he could only palm it back to Adam who made no mistake at the second attempt. Staplegrave pressed hard for the elusive equaliser in the last few minutes of the game but **Dulverton held out to take the win**. That result put them in 8th position in the league.

On 23rd November, Dulverton Reserves took on Rhode Lane Wanderers at home where they ran out 7-1 winners. **Josh Hopkins led the line for Town with four strikes**, Lee Hooper, Ben Swinton and Vincent Towers all added one each. That win moved the reserves up to 3rd place in Division 4 and with the top two side not playing, it gave them the chance to close the gap which they did with a 4v2 home win over Williton.
